DELIVERANCE

God's Word is filled with many instances of deliverance, all pointing to and illustrating the grand deliverance of our salvation in Christ.

The lessons for this quarter follow the drama of the deliverance of God's people, Israel, from centuries of slavery in Egypt as recorded in Exodus. You will get a glimpse of how God planned and executed this great deliverance, prepared His people for it, overcame humanly insurmountable obstacles, and revealed His glory through the process.

In the first unit, you will get a sense of the terrible oppression that God's people were suffering under. Here we will be introduced to the man whom God would shape and use for the great task of deliverance: Moses. You will see the divinely orchestrated circumstances of his birth, a long period with a seeming lack of purpose, and his dramatic call at the flaming bush that did not burn up. Through these lessons, you will see that God takes His time in preparing His servants but moves quickly when the time is right.

The second unit recounts the immediate preparations necessary for the deliverance of an entire nation from its bondage to an oppressing power. These preparations mostly involved bringing those oppressors to a state of willingness to release God's people from their subjugation. This was accomplished through a series of increasingly severe, supernatural plagues. The pharaoh's stubbornness was so great, however, that it took the sudden death of every firstborn in Egypt for him to agree to release the Hebrew slaves. The section ends with a massively significant act of preparation undertaken by the Israelites. This was the Passover, the means by which God's people were spared the judgment of death, which has been yearly celebrated throughout their history ever since. Passover became the great picture of what Jesus would accomplish for His people on the cross.

The third and final unit follows the Israelites as they departed the land of their oppression, only to be pursued by Pharaoh's army. At the point of seeming hopelessness, God accomplished Israel's final deliverance at the Red Sea. God opened a miraculous way of escape, leading to the final destruction of the enemy. Even after untold centuries, it is still thrilling to walk with God's people through this decisive moment.

Let these lessons inspire you to trust our awesome God more fully and help you to see His glory in even the darkest days He may call you to pass through.


Israel's Suffering


GOLDEN TEXT: "The Egyptians made the children of Israel to serve with rigour: and they made their lives bitter with hard bondage" (Exodus 1:13-14).

Exodus 1:7 And the children of Israel were fruitful, and increased abundantly, and multiplied, and waxed exceeding mighty; and the land was filled with them.

- 8 Now there arose up a new king over Egypt, which knew not Joseph.
- 9 And he said unto his people, Behold, the people of the children of Israel are more and mightier than we:
- 10 Come on, let us deal wisely with them; lest they multiply, and it come to pass, that, when there falleth out any war, they join also unto our enemies, and fight against us, and so get them up out of the land.
- 11 Therefore they did set over them taskmasters to afflict them with their burdens. And they built for Pharaoh treasure cities, Pithom and Raamses.
- 12 But the more they afflicted them, the more they multiplied and grew. And they were grieved because of the children of Israel.
- 13 And the Egyptians made the children of Israel to serve with rigour:
- 14 And they made their lives bitter with hard bondage, in morter, and in brick, and in all manner of service in the field: all their service, wherein they made them serve, was with rigour.
 - 15 And the king of Egypt spake to the Hebrew midwives,

of which the name of the one was Shiphrah, and the name of the other Puah:





work very hard.

When ye do the office of a midwife to the Hebrew women, and see them upon the stools; if it be a son, then ye shall kill him: but if it be a daughter, then she shall live.

- 17 But the midwives feared God, and did not as the king of Egypt commanded them, but saved the men children alive.
- 18 And the king of Egypt called for the midwives, and said unto them, Why have ye done this thing, and have saved the men children alive?
- 19 And the midwives said unto Pharaoh, Because the Hebrew women are not as the Egyptian women; for they are lively, and are delivered ere the midwives come in unto them.
- 20 Therefore God dealt well with the midwives: and the people multiplied, and waxed very mighty.
- 21 And it came to pass, because the midwives feared God, that he made them houses.
- 22 And Pharaoh charged all his people, saying, Every son that is born ye shall cast into the river, and every daughter ye shall save alive.

Teacher Helps

The Hebrews had increased in number, leading the Egyptians to seek some way to control them. Pharaoh set taskmasters over the Israelites, and they were forced to build the treasure cities Pithom and Raameses. Later, Pharaoh ordered all male Hebrew children to be killed by the Hebrew midwives who assisted the birthing mothers—something the righteous Hebrew midwives refused to do. As a result, God blessed the midwives.

Ask the children why God blessed the midwives. Ask what they think would have happened if the midwives had obeyed Pharaoh's orders.

This week's Bible story is a simple lesson on faithfulness to God over man.

Themes to Stress

- Believers in God will sometimes go through very trying times.
- Faithfulness to God is a necessity.
- God blesses those who are faithful to Him.

Learn It and Live It!

- Ask: The Israelites were going through a very difficult time. Can you think of a difficult time you went through? How did God bring you through it?
- Ask: Sometimes it is hard to do what is right like the midwives. Describe a time when you had to make the difficult choice to do the right thing. What happened?

Bible Doctrine Link: God's Glory Through Suffering—I Peter 4:13

Despite their suffering in Egypt, God's blessing was on the children of Israel. He was keeping His promise to Abraham that his descendants would be as large in number as the "stars of the heaven" (Genesis 22:17). The New Testament church suffered persecution in Jerusalem. Christians scattered away from the city, but everywhere the believers went, they told people about Jesus (Acts 8:4). God's kingdom increased, and God received the glory (I Peter 4:13). God blessed Israel when they were being oppressed, and He received the glory that is due His name. As you tell others about the Lord, He desires to use your life to glorify Himself too!

Bible Lesson

Would you ever forget about someone who saved you, your family, and your entire country from starving to death? That sounds like

someone who should surely be remembered and honored.

Abraham's great-grandson Joseph had been used by God to do just that. God had given Joseph the ability to understand the meaning of a strange dream that the king of Egypt had. Joseph instructed the pharaoh about what his dream meant and what he should do. Joseph's advice kept the people of Egypt and the surrounding lands from starving.

Pharaoh was very grateful to Joseph and his family. But eventually Joseph died, and a new pharaoh came to power.

New pharaoh, bad news (Exodus 1:7-14). Seventy members of Joseph's family had come to live in Egypt during the great famine. This group included his eleven brothers and his father, Jacob, to whom the Lord had given the new name of Israel. They were all Abraham's promised descendants through his son Isaac.

Their family continued to grow until they became the nation of Israel. The people of Israel are also sometimes called the Hebrews. Joseph and his brothers all died, but the number of their descendants continued to multiply.

The new pharaoh became worried. What if the children of Israel join forces with one of our enemies and fight against us in battle? he thought. Pharaoh came up with an evil plan. He decided to enslave the children of Israel and to treat them badly. He put taskmasters in charge of them and made them build the two cities that later became known as Pithom and Raamses.

The Egyptian taskmasters were very harsh toward the

people of Israel. But the worse they were treated, the more God caused Israel to increase in number. The Egyptians were afraid of how many of them there were.

Pharaoh's ruthless plan (Exodus 1:15-19). When Pharaoh's first plan did not work, he came up with a new plan that was even more cruel. He would stop the children of Israel from growing in number by having all the Hebrew boys killed when they were born.

Shiphrah and Puah were the women in charge of helping the Hebrew women deliver their babies. Pharaoh instructed them to kill all the baby boys as soon as they were born but to let the girls live. But the two women feared God more than Pharaoh, even though he was the king of Egypt.

Pharaoh's plan was still not working. He asked Shiphrah and Puah why they were not killing the Hebrew boys as instructed. They told him that the Hebrew women gave birth to their babies before they could arrive to help them.

God's kindness prevails (Exodus 1:20-22). God showed kindness to Shiphrah and Puah. He blessed them with families of their own. He also caused Israel to continue growing in number. Pharaoh did not like this and commanded all his people to drown the Hebrew boys that were born by throwing them into the Nile River.

Even though the evil pharaoh tried to stop the people of Israel from increasing, their number kept on growing. Through all their hard work and suffering, God gave Israel strength.

Going through tough times and dealing with pain and suffering is a part of life. In your tough times, you can always turn to God to receive strength. More tough times lay ahead for Israel, but God would still be with them.

A Bitter Load

Even though God was blessing the children of Israel with big families, they were forced to do all the hard work for the Egyptians, building things and working the fields. The Hebrews' lives were made bitter. To help illustrate what bitterness is, you will need a bag of 85 percent (or higher) cacao chocolate chips. Divide the class into two groups. With each group in a line on opposite sides of the room, facing the other group, have one child carry a heavy object (within reason, such as a stack of books or light hand weight) to the child opposite him. That child will carry the object to the second child on the first side and so on. Once every child has carried the weight once, start over again. This time, give each child two or three of the chocolate chips to eat as he carries the weight.
